Dear Members and Friends of St. Paul's.

A blessed Easter Season to you all! I've noticed an interesting shift in worship. Of course, attendance is a bit down, but, given the precautions we're still observing, it's not as small as I'd imagined. Before the virus, we were seeing 100-120 people in person each week. Now it is more common to see 60-70. We do know that about 30 or so are watching, either the live stream or the later recording, so overall, we are not far down.

But I've noticed some newer and younger faces, too. I'm not sure what that means, but everything I'm reading from colleagues is that the last year is bringing about a re-alignment within our religious communities. I think we're seeing some of that here. Some folks who used to be regulars have simply gotten "out of the habit" of Sunday worship. Some of those are attending on line; others have just dropped out. Some who were impatient for our re-opening have migrated to other parishes that opened earlier. Whether they will return to St. Paul's is not known, but probably not all will. Some have deeply longed to return, and are among the 60-70 we're seeing each week. Some are very eager to come back, but health issues are keeping them away for a bit longer. Others would come, but miss the traditional hymns and/or communion and/or coffee hour, so they stay home until those things return. In addition, some new faces are now regularly volunteering on Sundays, to make each service flow as smoothly as possible.

The other interesting thing I've noticed is that some who were not very connected are now beginning to find their way to our ministry, either in person or online. Something has begun to sprout that no one anticipated. An opportunity is presenting itself that we need to respond to. I'll ask you to do some things to foster a new and fresh community life for our congregation.

If you are physically coming to worship, please let all your family, friends, and neighbors know. Some of them may find that they would like to join you. You can assure them that we are taking reasonable precautions for everyone's health, but still gathering for praise and prayer.

Let everyone know of our on-line ministry. Even if you do not watch the whole service each Sunday, you can open it and share it to your Facebook or other social media page. This will give more and more people a taste of our Gospel centered mission. I have a hunch that this outreach may become very important as time goes on.

Remind everyone you can that the ELCA is a church that values all people. The news is full of Christian voices that do not share our vision of an inclusive Church that worships an inclusive God. Especially now, as people are re-assessing their own spiritual needs, people need to know that there is a place for them in our family of faith, our community of grace. A safe place with a message of love for all is still very good news for many, many people.

Finally, if you know of people in specific need who can use our help, please let me know. We can't meet all needs, but we may be able to touch more lives with practical help if we know about it.

As we move forward together, I'd love to hear from any of you about how your own faith journey has been affected by the last year's changes. We can stand by one another for mutual healing, both literal, physical healing, and the re-establishment of a wholesome spiritual and psychological environment for all of us. God has not abandoned us, but we may find divine grace in new places or ways. And in all things, may a measure of God's peace and joy find its way into your hearts.

And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him who have been called according to his purpose. Romans 8:28

<sup>6</sup> Paul and his companions traveled throughout the region of Phrygia and Galatia, having been kept by the Holy Spirit from preaching the word in the province of Asia. <sup>7</sup> When they came to the border of Mysia, they tried to enter Bithynia, but the Spirit of Jesus would not allow them to. <sup>8</sup> So they passed by Mysia and went down to Troas. <sup>9</sup> During the night Paul had a vision of a man of Macedonia standing and begging him, "Come over to Macedonia and help us." <sup>10</sup> After Paul had seen the vision, we got ready at once to leave for Macedonia, concluding that God had called us to preach the gospel to them. Acts 16:6-10

These two Bible selections may not seem to be related at first; however, it has been my experience that when we pray about a situation where we ask for guidance or we don't know how to proceed, God is very much listening.

In Acts 16, Luke is writing about Paul and preaching the gospel, but I believe God will also guide us in <u>our personal decisions</u> as well. He will close doors where He does not want you to go and He will open doors to give you an opportunity that will benefit you or someone you are praying for. You may not always understand what He is doing, but I think if you really pay attention and be open to God's guidance, you will be surprised at what is happening. You need to trust Him day-by-day. Just as He gave the manna to Israel in the desert day-by-day, He will walk you through his plan day-by-day.

Because my recent experiences are not mine alone to share, I can only tell you that somehow God has lead my family on quite a journey, from college decisions to housing decisions, to personal decisions. To pray, to trust, to act on, and then to watch Him work is amazing. He has closed some doors only to open others and it has always been for the good. Thank you Jesus. Children's art work will be posted in their portfolios and they can invite family and friends (their "fans") to come by to see their work. From there, fans can purchase items with their artwork on it, including mugs, aprons, T shirts, canvas and MORE! Funds raised will go towards our Tuition Assistance Fund. This annual event was established several years ago by a family who benefitted from some tuition assistance and saw this as a way to give back what they were gifted.

Though it has been a challenging year due to the pandemic and the guidelines we needed to follow from the Office of Early Childhood to stay healthy, it has been a good year. As I mentioned earlier, it could not have happened without the strong staff we have in place. Many child care centers had the challenge of teachers not wanting to return because of Covid, but our brave teachers faced the challenges with grace and perseverance! We have stayed healthy throughout the year! I want to take a moment to recognize this amazing team! Our Lead Teachers, Lezlie Fosbrook, Monica Valente and Michelle Miller, the coteachers, Christina Brzoska and Nicole Sears, as well as the assistants, Megan Roberts and Nicole Waldron have all been an amazing team. I have been honored to be working with them through this pandemic.

A special recognition to the Hilltop Advisory Committee as they supported and helped me navigate the uncertain waters we went through this year. I was sad to see Ron Travis leave the board, but want to recognize him for all the years he has dedicated to Hilltop. He often helped with hiring new staff. He was the voice of reason from time to time. I also miss his sense of humor! Pam Little has been the lone chairperson this year, and has taken on a lot more than she bargained for when she joined the committee! The grants we have applied for and received could not have been done without her! Now she is faced with filling the most difficult positions in a preschool. A new leader. The rest of the committee has been faithful all year....Michelle, Christine, Jane and Casaundra. Thank you for your dedication to Hilltop!

Thank you to the property committee. They help keep us safe by maintaining the area we use. They have kept us safe from the sleepy bear who took up residence under the church. Such a dedicated group of people!

A special thanks to Rachel and Jean. Rachel supports Hilltop in so many ways, always with a joyful heart and a smile on her face. The work Jean does for Hilltop is a part time job on its own, never mind adding it on to the duties she has for the church! She is a true gift!

Registrations for the 2021-2022 school year is still ongoing. The state has now lifted all Covid restrictions around the capacity of our classes, so we have lots of room. We are still considering how we might be able to continue to social distance with higher attendance in the fall. Here is hoping and praying we can restore our numbers to pre-Covid attendance! We gratefully got through one year, but I am not sure we can make it through a second year without increasing our enrollment! Please keep referring your friends and families to Hilltop. Once classes are filled, we maintain waiting lists for all classes, so continue to send folks our way. At this time, we will have openings in all of our classes. Our program choices include:

- 2 year olds meet Tuesdays and Thursdays 9:30-11:00
- **3 year olds** meet 2 or 3 days a week. 3 year olds attend Mondays & Wednesdays, 9:30-12:00. These children can add a third day to their schedule on Fridays.
- **4 year olds** have more choices. They can come Monday, Wednesday & Friday or Tuesday & Thursday 9:15-11:45. They could combine both class choices and make it 5 mornings a week.
- **School Readiness** is our publicly funded class for preschool children who live in Torrington and fit within financial guidelines for a LOW COST preschool experience. This class meets Monday through Friday 9:00-3:00.

## THE GARDENS





#### **Monarch Sanctuary Waystation**

April was a busy month for the first phase in resurrecting the Waystation. A stone border was placed around the Sanctuary and multiple soil amendments and raking were conducted. The soil analysis from UCONN reflected the Sanctuary lacking in every major soil nutrient. Consequently, Lime, Blood Meal and Greensand were applied and worked into the soil over several weeks and applications. Composting of the areas to be planted will be required as we plant later in

May and June. Walking paths and other features (bird bath, bird houses) will be added once the initial design has been

completed. A generous donation was received for soil amendments, and milkweed and perennial plants are being donated but additional financial donations would be sincerely appreciated to assist in our resurrection efforts.



#### **Sharing Garden:**

April was a month for planning and preparation for the new growing season. The soil analysis report was returned from UCONN and, in general, the Sharing Garden soil was adequate for planting without amendments. Many of the beds will require additional topsoil but no additional composting is needed.

Through a generous donation by Mike Butler in New Hartford, natural wood material was cut and milled for 4 new raised beds. Mike delivered the wood and June & Steve Seiser and Janice Capolupo assembled the new beds and removed the old. One of the new beds has already been planted with peas, and the remaining new beds will support potato and squash. In addition to the pea raised bed, 3 other beds have been planted with frost resistant leafy greens and root vegetables. Germination is ongoing, and with the first green shoots, "hope springs eternal".

In late May, after the last frost, the remainder of the beds will be planted and the soaker hoses tested, programmed, and activated. Until then, the gardeners will be hand watering the planted beds with water stored in our holding barrel.






