A Word from Pastor Cady



Greetings Beloved,

April brings us to Holy Week and the festive Easter season. For any who might like a reminder of the meaning of these powerful and central events, I'll offer a summary. First we note that, unlike Christmas, Easter is determined by a lunar calendar. It is on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Vernal Equinox. Our Jewish neighbors' Passover festival is similarly on a lunar cycle, so Passover and Easter are often celebrated close to one another. Passover this year is April 5. Our Eastern Orthodox Christian neighbors use a slightly different calendar, too, so they will observe Easter on April 16, one week after we do.

Palm/Passion Sunday is April 2 this year. On this Sunday we recall two central stories of Jesus' last days. We open the service with a blessing of palm branches and hear the story of the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. Of course Jesus was Jewish, so he had come to the holy city to celebrate Passover that year, probably about 30 A.D. Then the service shifts to a reading of the Passion of Christ, this year from Matthew. Passion here means "suffering." It covers the entire set of scenes from his arrest to his burial. Usually in this service we divide up the long Gospel reading so that members read the various parts, which also gives a somewhat more dramatic feel to the text.

In America, churches do not usually gather for worship on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. But Maundy Thursday is a very popular service. Maundy comes from the Latin word "mandatum," meaning "commandment." At this service we do several things. One is that we pronounce a strong Absolution that brings to a conclusion the Confession we spoke on Ash Wednesday. Another is that we offer foot washing. At the Last Supper, Jesus washed his disciples' feet. While most members do not choose to participate, those who do find it a moving and tender gesture that well communicates the humble service Christ calls us to do for one another. We celebrate communion, as directed by Christ, and we close the service with a stripping of the altar. In this ritual, the altar represents Christ. As all ornamentation is removed, we recall the part of the Passion in which Jesus is stripped of his garments before being flogged and crucified. We leave the darkened church in silence.

On Good Friday there are a variety of services offered by churches such as Seven Last Words - the sayings uttered by Christ on the cross, usually offered midday. There are also often evening services on Good Friday, sometimes referred to as Tenebrae - from the Latin for Darkness. Good Friday is called Good because, even though it was a horrible death for Jesus, Christians believe that in that act, Christ defeated the powers of death and sin and won our eternal salvation. St. Paul's will have a Tenebrae at 7pm while our Methodist neighbors will offer a noon service. Our Tenebrae will include a reading of the Passion according to John, an extended time of prayer for all kinds of people in the world, an opportunity to come forward to touch or kneel before a rough cross, and a solo of Were You There. The tone is solemn and reflective as we contemplate our Lord's death and burial.

On Saturday some churches hold a service called the Vigil of Easter. This is a very extended service, sometimes lasting 2 or 3 hours. It begins in the evening with a "new fire" outside, a procession into the church, a series of readings from the Old Testament about God's mighty acts of salvation or promises of redemption. There is a baptismal affirmation, flowing into a festive Eucharist - a Greek word meaning Thanksgiving - more commonly known as communion. We do not offer this service, but if you find one, it's a beautiful experience.

Here at St. Paul's we will begin our Easter festivities at 6am with a lay-led Sunrise Service in our Memorial Garden that will include communion. Later, at 10am, we will have our traditional festive communion to celebrate the resurrection of our Lord from the grave. This service begins a 7-week season of Easter, focusing on the central event in our spiritual journey - the victory of life over death in and through the person and work of Jesus Christ.

The bodily resurrection from his tomb, followed by his appearances to the disciples forms the core of our faith that the words and deeds of Jesus are truly of divine origin. His rising to new and eternal life are a kind of pledge that through God's grace we, too, can share in his unending life in blessedness.

Let us rejoice in this holy season and cling closely to the promise we have in and through our Lord!

Meet Me in the Garden

The earth and everything in it, the world and its inhabitants, belong to the Lord; for He laid its foundation on the seas and established it on the rivers. Psalm 24:1-2

"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moths and vermin destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. ²⁰ But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moths and vermin do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" Matt 6:19-21

28...as the king was walking on the roof of the royal palace of Babylon, ³⁰ he said, "Is not this the great Babylon_I have built as the royal residence, by my mighty power and for the glory of my majesty?"

³¹ Even as the words were on his lips, a voice came from heaven, "This is what is decreed for you, King Nebuchadnezzar: Your royal authority has been taken from you. ³² You will be driven away from people and will live with the wild animals; you will eat grass like the ox. Seven times will pass by for you until you acknowledge that the Most High is sovereign over all kingdoms on earth and gives them to anyone he wishes." Daniel 4:28-32

Are you conscious of the fact that when we give, we are giving a thank offering to the Father Himself?

Your giving can be an act of love. It can be a response to His love and acknowledgment that all that we have is from Him. We are just temporary stewards of his treasures, time and talents. Knowing this, we may see a pleasure in giving, and see the benefits as they help build the body of Christ.

You may wonder why I included Daniel 4:28-32. This is about King Nebuchadnezzar's pride. He did not give God the glory for all that he had; he gave himself the glory. "I did this, I worked for this, it was my intelligence that did this, my talent, and so on..." Ever heard that? Ever thought that? That is pride! Now pride in the right place is good. I am proud of my children and my grandchildren. But God is the one who has provided and it is right to give Him the glory for what we have and for what we have accomplished. Nebuchadnezzar took credit for all that he had and his pride took him down! He did not give God the Glory!

Let us, at St. Paul's, give God the glory for all that He has given each of us by generously giving back to Him. God does not need your money but He wants your heart, and where your treasure is, there is your heart. (Matt. 6:21)

Are you really giving in proportion to the material blessings that the Lord has given you?

The Bible teaches that Christian giving should be done in accordance with our means. Paul is quite clear on this: "For if the readiness is present, it is acceptable according to what a person has, not according to what he does not have" (2 Corinthians 8:12). Put another way Paul is saying that you should give in proportion to what God has given you. He said it this way in 1 Corinthians 16:2, "each one of you is to put aside and save, as he may prosper." This means at least two things: (1) since we are all supposed to give proportionately, those who have more money are expected to give more [we who are particularly blessed materially must remember this], and (2) the Lord never asks us to give what we do not have, or contribute beyond our means.

Prayerfully decide on how you plan to implement God's desires and ask to be a better steward of all the relationships, time, talent, money and resources in your life, remembering what Christ did for us on the cross because of His amazing love for us. Peace to all.




